

Highlights of our work (Overview of Ekam's programs)


No child should be denied the right to healthcare (Save a Child Program)


Access to healthcare is a known predictor of child mortality. Many underprivileged families endure the harrowing and daunting experience of dealing with life-threatening illnesses and medical situations in children, owing to their inability to pay for the treatment. At Ekam, we believe that hat no child should be denied the right to healthcare based on their socioeconomic status.

Our 'Save a Child' program works to provide medical support and assistance to any child who needs us. We begin by identifying children needing support, facilitating their treatment (Including any expenses) till their discharge, counselling the parents/guardians and following up with the families post-discharge to ensure they comply with the doctor's advice. We work round the clock to ensure that every child who is referred to us is treated in a caring and dignified environment. Leveraging existing resources within the public health facilities is Ekam's priority at all times. We also make sure that government schemes like insurance and other services are being fully utilized by communities.

Stories of Hope

Light at the End of the Tunnel

When Suraj was 5 months old, he developed breathing problems and had to be taken to Kancheepuram Government Hospital; and then later shifted to Chengalpattu Medical College Hospital due to shortage of infrastructure for treatment. The baby was then referred to ICH, Egmore for advanced care and later shifted to Apollo Children's Hospital where he underwent a Device closure procedure. To their dismay, the baby's parents Mrs.Kalaivani and Mr.Yuvaraj informed that the were surgery exhausted unsuccessful. They were and helpless.

In cases of repeated extubation failure, Tracheotomy was done (is a surgical procedure that consists of making an incision on the anterior aspect of the neck and opening a direct airway through an incision in the trachea). The medical team at Apollo decided to shift the child to Kanchi Kamakoti Childs Trust Hospital for further treatment.

On 11/9/2019 Suraj was admitted to PICU and was treated under CPAP, which involved 20 days stay at PICU. When he was told that the total treatment cost was around Rs.1, 92,680/-Mr.Yuvaraj broke down. Being unemployed, and having already spent around Rs. 4,00,000/- for the device closure procedure.

Realizing their miserable plight, the hospital team approached Ekam to seek financial assistance for the child's treatment. Ekam supported a sum of Rs. 70,000/-. Soon the child became stable with good heart rate and blood pressure and was discharged from the hospital. Without Ekam's intervention, Suraj and his family's situation would've been hopeless.



Twin Angels of Joy

To every parent, the birth of twin babies brings immense joy, irrespective of which background they belong to. Mr. Sooriyan, a pavement fruit seller who hails from Tiruvallur district was delighted to know that his wife had given birth to twin babies in a private hospital. The joy was shortlived when the doctor informed him that the babies were categorized as Preterm (29 weeks). Moreover, they also suffered from respiratory distress syndrome, which required them to be on ventilator support. The news shattered him. As the only

earning member, Mr. Sooriyan was helpless and had no reserve to arrange the cost of the treatment. He went door to door seeking financial help from friends and relatives, but couldn't manage to get the amount for treatment.

This was when the medical team approached us to seek financial aid. The babies completed treatment and were discharged from the hospital. They now live healthy, happy lives. Whenever Sooriyan looks at his twin angels, he feels eternally grateful to the support that Ekam provided at the right time, which saved their lives.

WHAT EKAM DOES

Sustainable wellbeing for sustained development - (SWBI)

We believe that maternal and child health is directly linked to the well-being of the community. Our health-centric community improvement program termed as Sustainable Well Being Initiative focuses on the dynamic relationship between health, socio-economic conditions, and environmental resources. SWBI is strategically divided into four areas of thrust namely Health, Environment, Livelihood and Governance. Each area consists of key interventions, IEC, capacity building, surveillance, monitoring and evaluation activities, process innovation and governance. The program is structured to address and solve the problems of the village at the micro-level and serves as a preventive care mechanism contributing directly to lower infant and maternal mortality rates.

Youth for Change - Ekam youth ambassador (EYA) program

Education and the willingness to serve can equip the younger generation to take charge and bring forward solutions to build sustainable communities. Through our Youth Ambassador Program, we aim at empowering youth to promote access to quality maternal and child healthcare in rural villages of India. We hope to create a team of committed, responsible youth who work selflessly to fulfil our mission.

Adopt a Village Initiative

Our young ambassadors (EYA) have the potential to voice the needs of a village and to help bring change. This was the idea behind the 'Adopt a village' initiative. Our team conducted village-level surveys across several districts in Tamil Nadu, identified the gaps in the delivery of essential services like healthcare, education water and sanitation and so on. An Ekam Youth Ambassador (EYA) from of our USA chapters was assigned one to three villages from Tamil Nadu. They were entrusted with the task of addressing the need gaps through their fundraising activities.

Impact

In 2018, we met the needs of five villages in Madurai, Tiruvannamalai, Erode and Nagapattinam districts of Tamil Nadu with the help of funds raised by EYA's from four of our Ekam USA Chapters. The initiatives included:

- Infrastructure Support for schools
- Educational Tools for schools and ICDS centres
- Construction of toilets in schools
- Revamp of Library
- Medical equipment and infrastructure for PHC







Equipped for a better future - Eicher group project

Project RMNCH and strengthening of 5 PHCs

Our partnership with the EGF (Eicher Group Foundation) commenced in 2018 with a vision to work towards holistic health and sustainable well-being of mothers and children in Kancheepuram. Targeted community-based efforts are being made within 4 panchayats of Kancheepuram namely Vallam, Nattarasampattu, Valayamkaranai and Sennakuppam towards the same objective. The focus is on bringing in sustainable change through people's participation in healthcare.

STATE FOCUS - KARNATAKA



In addition to knowledgeable staff, health centres need effective medical equipment to provide quality maternal and child healthcare. Providing critical equipment to government hospitals is one of the main ways in which we help save children's lives. We arrange the procurement of high priority, life-saving and diagnostic medical equipment that empowers healthcare workers with the tools they need to save lives and provide reliable care.

Cheluvamba Hospital in Mysuru was one of the recipients of our equipment support program. We were able to reach out to over 450 babies per month and improve their health outcomes.

We donated 4 units of Pulse meter and 4 units of Infusion pumps to the emergency ward at Cheluvamba Hospital, Mysuru.

In the year 2019-20 we have supported 5078 beneficiaries through the donation of this equipment.

State Focus - Ekam Chhattisgarh

A crucial step to combat infant mortality is to improve newborn health. Special Newborn Care Units (SNCUs) have been set up by the government to improve the condition of infant care delivery. Our initiatives to support the SNCUs revolve around the provision of Human resources, Capacity building and training, establishing a Helpline for equipment maintenance, and through Improving the System for Healthcare Availability (ISHA).

Human Resource Support

SNCUs require the availability of trained clinical and clerical professionals for their effective functioning. We have been supporting SNCUs in Chhattisgarh through the provision of Human Resource personnel.

We have recruited the following medical staff across 23 SNCUs in the state:

- Clinical Nurses (70)
- Medical Officers (17)
- Specialist Pediatrician (01)
- Clerical Data Entry Operators (04)

Capacity Building Support

We have been involved in providing Facility Based Newborn Care Training and Observership training to the existing and newly recruited paediatricians, medical officers and staff nurses to enhance their capacity.

Facility Based Newborn Care training (Pt. J.N.M. Medical College, Raipur)

- 4 Batches of training organised
- 91 Medical Officers and Staff Nurses trained

Observership training (KEM Mumbai)

- 3 batch of training organized
- 15 Medical officers and staff Nurses trained

Helpline Support

We have established a 24x7 equipment helpline number in the Chhattisgarh office for the maintenance of medical equipment and a central Helpline has been set up to handle equipment breakdown calls. The Helpline officer makes cold calls to staff nurses every alternate day to verify equipment functioning and ensure effective functioning of the health facility.

1401 cold calls made to 25 SNCUs

Improving System for Healthcare Availability (ISHA)

Environmental Microbial Surveillance

Infection is a great area of concern, especially for preterm babies. It's a fact that we are losing many babies, because of sepsis in resource-limited settings. While it is difficult to treat neonatal sepsis, it is rather easier to prevent infections. We conduct environmental microbial surveillance of the labour room through the collection of pre-cleaning, post-cleaning swabs and air samples to test the presence of microorganisms.

Nurse Mentoring

To improve the quality of Maternal and Child Healthcare in the state, we have partnered with UNICEF in recruiting mentor nurses in Bastar, Narayanpur and Bijapur districts.

They are given the responsibility of training field staff nurses on Quality ANC, Maternal Complications and Safe Delivery, Neonatal Resuscitation, Hypothermia prevention, Documentation and Change Management.

Impact

- A marked increase in ANC visits
- Increased sense of facility ownership among nurses
- Improved management of maternal complications thereby reducing cases of casualty
- Improved management of neonatal complications from 47% to 85%
- Increased practice of partograph guided delivery to 30% in all districts.
- The highest improvement in institutional delivery is found in Narayanpur
- Early high-risk diagnosis and optimal management for better maternal and perinatal outcomes

Survival of the Child in Safe Hand

Safe Hands of SNCU for the survival of child at Ekam Foundation Supported SNCU facility which specialises in neonatal care and management— In Chhattisgarh

The baby was born on 24th Feb 2019 at district hospital Kondgaon – a full-term baby, with perinatal asphyxia "This time my baby survived I believe because of SNCU where he was brought soon after birth. I am happy that despite being so small he is feeding well and gaining strength. All thanks to the care he is receiving at this special hospital for babies."

"The initiation of such a facility was made keeping in view that Kondgaon has an infant mortality rate much higher than the state average. "An urgent need was felt for specialized care for neonates apart from highly skilled neonatal care and support which can bring down the infant mortality rate in the district."

Such success stories are becoming common ever since SNCU was set up 1 Year by EKAM Foundation and UNICEF with the help of the Department of Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of Chhattisgarh.

Every day a new success story is created at the SNCU. Most cases, however, have not been recorded. To address this information gap, the facility is putting systems in place to capture the information.



Linking additional services to make the initiative sustainable

"Most children when discharged are quite well and the doctors here ask the mothers to bring them back for a follow-up checkup", Now we are working on a system to keep a record of patients' addresses and telephone numbers and a health worker will be sent to make an HBNC follow-up check on the wellbeing of the child and mother post their discharge from the hospital.

Another facility to be provided to pregnant women and critically ill patients in surrounding villages is a transportation facility.
